Saint of the Week - St. Raymond of Penafort.

Raymond was born in 1175 in Penafort, near Barcelona in Spain. He was a brilliant lawyer and at the age of 47 became a Canon of the Cathedral and joined the Dominican Order, eventually being elected their master general. Noted for his knowledge of canon law, especially in its application to the sacrament of penance, and for his scholarly apostolate to Jews and Muslims. Raymond died in 1275 and was buried in the Cathedral of Barcelona. He was canonised by Pope Clement VIII in 1601 and is the patron saint of canon lawyers. His feast day is celebrated on *7th Jan*.

The Feast of the Epiphany

The Feast which is celebrated on 6th January commemorates the visit of the wise men (the Maji) to worship the Baby Jesus. Tradition tells us that their names were Caspar, Melchior and Balthassar. The men were astrologers who were looking for the star that would lead them to the promised Messiah. The wise men brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh with them. These gifts were very meaningful. Gold was a precious and expensive gift and showed how important Jesus was. Frankincense is a sweet perfume which was often burned in the temple to worship God. It was a sign that Jesus should be worshipped. Myrrh was used to keep things fresh, and it was used by the women to anoint Jesus' body when he died. By bringing it as a gift to Jesus, the wise men foretold his suffering and death.

Gospel Reflection

In today's Gospel (John 1: 1-18) we hear that "The Word was made flesh, and He lived among us". From the very beginning of time the Word was with God and the Word was God. And the Word brought life and light into the world. God sent his only Son, Jesus, into the world to be with us to show us how to live our earthly lives and to get to know God better. By listening to Jesus through prayer and meditation and by following his example we can learn to live our lives as God wants us to.

Jesus came to earth as one of us, as a human being, even though he was God's son. Like our ordinary daily lives, He too lived an ordinary life in many ways and so He knows what it is like for us living our lives today. He also experienced the ups and downs of life and the emotional rollercoaster that life can sometimes be. So, when we share our problems and worries with Jesus in prayer, we can rest assured that He will completely understand us and be with us during the difficult times. Of course, we should also share the good times with Jesus too and give thanks as He is always with us throughout our lives.

Towards the end of the Gospel, we are reminded that John the Baptist came before the Word. His role was to give witness to the light, but he himself was not the light. In many ways, the role of John is also ours. We are not the light, but we hope that through our baptism and participation in the light of the Christian community, we give witness to the light. And so, this week we pray that God may grant us an evergrowing understanding of his Word, as shown to us in the life and words of Jesus. Let us be filled with its light and share that light with others so they, too, may have the precious experience of knowing Jesus and the happiness and peace that it brings.
